elcome to this edition of the members' newsletter. At a time of increased pressure on all public resources, the staff at University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust are ensuring that their main priority is to drive up quality and improve the services provided to patients in all our nine hospitals, ensuring that we deliver improved care more effectively, more efficiently and make the very best use of the resources available to every patient.

Working closely with the governors and members is central to this.
Recently governors have been involved in giving comments and feedback on the redevelopments that are happening and planned for our buildings. Work is continuing at the Bristol Royal Hospital for Children to enable services to relocate from North Bristol NHS Trust for the centralisation of all specialist paediatric services in one dedicated building, to serve the

children and young people of Bristol, the South West and South Wales.

There is also a lot of work underway for the redevelopment of the Bristol Royal Infirmary. If you, or someone you know is coming to hospital, please allow more time to get here. If you can avoid coming by car then please do. There is a lot more information on our website, or speak to your clinic before your appointment.

These improvements to the BRI will transform many of our facilities and allow us to move all the beds and wards out of the Old Building, which no longer meets the accommodation standards that patients and staff both expect and deserve.

And finally, the Bristol General Hospital (BGH) will close on 4 April 2012; it will be a sad time for many. However, it is closing because a brand new purpose built hospital fit for 21st Century care is opening in South

Bristol. Many services will move from the BGH to the modern environment of the new South Bristol NHS Community Hospital, some will relocate back to the Bristol Royal Infirmary. On Saturday 3 March we are holding a final open day at the BGH from 10 am until 2pm. At South Bristol Community Hospital, an open day is planned for Tuesday 20 March 2012, and is open to the public from 2.30pm – 7pm (last entry at 6.30pm). There is no need to book for either event, just turn up.

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Medicine for members

A review of the recent Medicine for Members event



Amit Bahl, lead doctor at the **Bristol Haematology and Oncology** Centre, gave a very interesting and informative talk on developments in the treatment of breast and prostate cancer, two of the most common cancers in the UK, which account for thousands of deaths each year. The talk was very well attended, despite the severe weather forecast for that evening, and there was time for guestions from the audience. Dr Bahl also very kindly stayed on to answer questions on a one-to-one basis for those people who did not want to ask a public question.

Dr Bahl outlined the use of gold coils in the treatment of prostate cancer which enable the radiographers to target the radiation treatment to the prostate more accurately, thus reducing the chance of damage to the bowel or bladder, which can occur during treatment.

Dr Bahl also emphasised that every patient's treatment is tailored to their individual health profile and lifestyle. The many members of the team attending the multidisciplinary meetings all contribute to the overall best treatment for that particular patient.

There are two more events planned in 2012, look out for information in future newsletters.

Waiting times

There is lots of discussion in the NHS, by patients and their families and also in the media about hospital waiting times. If you, a member of your family or a friend is referred for treatment at hospital, or arrives by ambulance, you are entitled to assurance that they will be seen by a nurse or doctor quickly and will receive a diagnosis and treatment as soon as possible.

All NHS Trusts collect information to help deliver that assurance. When a GP writes to ask us to assess or treat a patient, or when someone arrives in the emergency department needing care, we keep a record of the care they receive and a note of how quickly we treat them.

Monitor, the organisation responsible for overseeing what we do, sets us a number of minimum standards that all NHS Foundation Trusts must achieve to give patients and their families assurance that care is being delivered quickly and is of high quality.

For those who are interested in the data and statistics, from October to December 2011, 91.8% of patients who needed to be admitted to one of our hospitals (after their GP had written to ask for an assessment) were admitted within 18 weeks. The target is 90% and not 100% because patients can ultimately choose their own appointments and sometimes they do, and some diagnoses are more

complex and take time to identify.

Monitor also asks all Foundation Trusts to see 95% of patients waiting in ED within four hours. This can sometimes be very challenging for hospitals, especially over the winter. Here at UH Bristol we didn't manage it in December, but we're working to improve the situation by making sure there are more empty beds available and that patients who need specialist reviews get them more quickly.

Timely care is vital for patients with cancer, so Monitor has set separate minimum standards in this area. At UH Bristol we are pleased to report that we met all nine of these specific standards from October to December 2011.

Alison Moon, chief nurse, and James Rimmer, chief operating officer, say: "Focusing on every patient receiving the right treatment at the right time means that we can ensure every patient receives good quality, timely care. If we need longer than expected to examine or diagnose a condition, we'll make sure we communicate that to patients and their families".

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Governor elections in 2013

Have you considered standing to be a governor and helping to shape our future?

Would you like to represent your members' views as a governor?

Members elect governors to represent their views on the Trust's future plans and the next elections are taking place from March 2013.

Governors are elected from the Trust's membership to serve on the Membership Council which oversees and advises on the work of the Trust. The Governor seats for election are:

- 2 seats in the Public South Gloucestershire constituency
- 2 seats in the Public Bristol constituency
- 2 seats in the Patient Non-local constituency
- 3 seats in the Local Patients constituency
- 2 seats in the Carers of Patients 16 years and over constituency
- 1 seat in the Staff constituency: other clinical healthcare professionals
- 2 seats in the Staff constituency: nursing and midwifery

What does a governor do?

Governors are one of our links to the community, representing the views and opinions of our membership. They do this by bringing their ideas, skills and experience to discussions and debates about our hospitals' future plans. This type of public involvement helps ensure that our services best reflect the needs of the local community.

What are the requirements for eligibility to stand for election to be a governor?

You may stand to become a governor if:

- You are a member of University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust
- You are over 16 years of age
- You are in one of the constituencies listed opposite
- You are able to commit a substantial amount of time to the role (approximately 8 – 10 hours per month)
