Last week, University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust were celebrating International Clinical Trials Day (20 May) with a series of activities and information events, to highlight the importance of taking part in research.

Research teams from throughout the Trust have been showcasing the studies they're involved in as well as providing interactive opportunities for people to find out more about how trials are improving patient care.

Events have included presentations from the Women's & Children's research team, highlighting the reproductive health research they've undertaken; the Bristol Eye Hospital team giving people the opportunity to try on a pair of glasses to see the effects of different eye diseases; an interactive display for children about why blood tests are taken, how they're done and how researchers spin blood; and the chance to take part in an example of a randomised trial at the Bristol Haematology Oncology Centre;

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1. News

ICH Good Clinical Practice

The ICH Good Clinical Practice E6 Guideline has been amended to reflect the changes in complexity, cost and technology in research over the last 20 years and will be effective from June 2017. The changes clarify standards on electronic records and essential documents and provide updated sponsor responsibilities. Examples include:

- A new section on Quality Management (specifically related to risk management)
- An increased requirement of sponsor oversight of delegated tasks
- A requirement for SOPs to cover electronic data handling
- An increase in risk based monitoring
- Sponsor responsibilities for resolving non-compliance.

The key message of ICH GCP remains the same. The standards are there to protect the rights, safety and wellbeing of research participants and to produce high quality research data. You do not need to book into updated GCP training as a result of these changes but it is strongly recommended that you familiarise yourselves with the updated addendum. Any future GCP courses you are booked into after June 2017 will incorporate these changes.




Cumulative Recruitment in Commercial and Non Commercial NIHR studies

Cumulative Weighted Recruitment to date 2017/18 compared to 2016/17 and 2015/16





3. Celebrating Successes

A world First for BHOC CTU

Huge congratulations to the BHOC Clinical Trials Team who opened a new trial on 9th May for patients following a bone marrow transplant. The trial, CYP-GVHD-PI-01 run by Cynata, is of a new cellular therapy product (iMSC) for graft versus host disease following a bone marrow transplant.

Thanks to their dedication and great work with other teams, the team administered the first dose of a new cellular therapy product to a patient on 12th May – a first for us in the Trust but also the first time this therapy product was given to a patient anywhere in the world. We know just how important research is in bringing in treatments for the future, but it also gives our patients another treatment option.

BHOC has recruited the 1st UK patient to the Trilogy trial

Well done to all involved in the Trilogy trial – BHOC has now recruited the 1st UK patient with very good timelines (considering multidepartment involvement). The study went to Research forum January 13th, open to recruitment 21st April, 1st patient consented 2nd May and randomised on 15th May.

The Principal Investigator for the study is Chris Herbert, with Research Nurses Stephen Lang & Nick Robins, and Matt Baxter who co-ordinated.

The Empire study has surpassed the recruitment target

Congratulations to the Medical Research team who have recruited over target for the Empire study which has led to reaching the 200 milestone. The target at UHBristol was 2 and the team have now recruited 3 patients.

The Celtaxsys Study Team said;

Today we achieved the major milestone of completing enrolment into the EMPIRE study with our 200th patient randomizing today.

This could not have happened without the hard work and dedication of your study teams, and most importantly, the willingness of your patients to contribute to efforts that could potentially help CF patients in the future.

Predict-Cat study

CRN West of England is ranked 2nd for recruitment per million for ophthalmology. Predict-Cat continues to recruit well having opened a second site within the LCRN, doubling recruitment compared to 2015-16. Performance in this study accounts for over three quarters of recruitment within the LCRN.

This is a huge achievement and real testament to all of those involved. Thank you to everyone for your tremendous efforts.



VIOLET study

Congratulations to The Surgical Research Team and the Thoracic Teams for reaching a milestone for the VIOLET study.

Research Nurse Karen Bobruk recruited the 100th patient to the study - VIdeo assisted thoracoscopic lobectomy versus conventional Open LobEcTomy for lung cancer, a multicentre randomised controlled trial with an internal pilot.



The Surgical Research Team recruited its 3000th patient

The team was created by Andy Ness in October 2010 and headed by Katrina Hurley and has gone from strength to strength.

Louise Flintoff and PI Stephen Broomfield recruited the patient into the OTO Phase 3 study, a study looking at a gel to hold the steroid used to treat Menieres disease, in the inner ear for longer.


