Cancer in teenagers and young adults

- ∇ancer in TYA is rare accounting for <1% of all cancers
 </p>
- ~2200 new cases every year
- Seven teenagers are diagnosed with cancer every day in the UK
- > 80% of TYA with cancer are alive 5 years after diagnosis
- Commonest cause of non-accidental death in TYA
 - **7** 9% of male and 15% of female deaths
 - 310 cancer deaths per year

Point of perspective: An average of 331,000 people are diagnosed with cancer in UK/year





South West Network Model of Care

- TYA cancer services in the UK has benefitted from a model of centralised care.
- Considered not the optimal model in the South West of the UK
- Challenges
 - Geography
 - Travel times to the PTC
- Possible to deliver high quality care at the designated hospital

TYA Services South West Cancer Service



South West Network Model of Care (2)

- Developed a network model of care
- Partnership across the South West
 - 7 1 Principal treatment Centre
 - 6 designated TYA networked hospitals
- TYA specialist nurse posts linked to the PTC and designated hospitals.
- Partnerships with 3rd sector
 - Capital and revenue investment

South West Network Model of Care (3)

'The overriding principle in the provision of services must be safe and effective services as locally as possible, not local services as safely as possible' (NICE, 2005)

- Addresses the key principles set out in the Teenage Cancer Trust 'Blueprint of Care'
- In line with the future of the health service as articulated in the NHS England Five Year Forward View
- Teenage Cancer Trust Northwest (NW) Pilot project
 - Improvement of patient pathways and patient experience
 - Age-appropriate support and site specialist expertise are offered at the earliest point.

South West Network Model of Care (4)

- TYA Multi-disciplinary Advisory Team (MDaT)
 - Weekly meetings
 - Uses online WebEx system
 - Allows teams from across the SW to take part
- Patients have access to tumour specific expertise and age appropriate support from specialist staff
- This model is now well developed

Supporting Holistic Needs assessment

- Assess the **impact** on all aspects of a young person's life
- Identify and discuss individualised needs
- Empowerment and self management
- Develop a domain based framework when working in partnership with Teenagers and Young Adult's (TYA)
- The Integrated Assessment Map or IAM was developed

The IAM – a simple beginning

'To develop a mechanism whereby we ensure that all TYA cancer patients in the South West receive the best possible care and support'

- → A simple framework for MDaT discussion
- ▼To capture patients priorities and needs
- **▼**To facilitate communication and relationship building
- **▼**To have a uniform approach to TYA care in the network
- **▼**To educate staff in holistic needs of TYA patients

The IAM Portal



- Electronic platform for TYA patients and professionals
- 10 domains linked to developmentally appropriate online resources
- Assessed independently or in partnership with professionals
- Accessible 24/7 for communication for non-urgent follow up



How is it used?



- Logons to the IAM portal is allocated via a member of the team and can download app
- Complete as assessment identifying their need in partnership or independently
- Green/amber/red
- Key points diagnosis, relapse and EOT
- IAM domains is the agenda to facilitate the MDaT discussion

What it is not



- Not a checklist
- Not a psychometric test or negate the need for other assessments
- Does not provide a 24/7 response to acute distress
- It is not given to the young adult without explanation

1. The IAM Portal offers....



TYA patients:

- individual access to a TYA specific holistic self assessment tool
- explore and document their needs
- obtain information and support from an framework of resources for self management.
- is be accessible as website and as an app





2. The IAM Portal offers....



TYA clinical teams:

- access to individual patient self assessment
- inform MDT and other discussions
- Patient voice at the centre of MDT discussions
- individualised care plans can be formulated

Professionals:

- access to the Portal
- same wide range of information and resources







3. The IAM Portal offers.....



TYA services and provider Trusts:

- access to a patient management system for managing MDT's and documenting its discussions
- reporting activity
- analysing patient need and assessing service demand

The NHS and its Voluntary Sector Partners:

- access reports of aggregated data from anonymised patient records
- providing a profile of TYA patients and their needs


- Online system for registration, MDT management and data collection


