Dear Sir/Madam

Thank you for your request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. The Trust's response is as follows:

Request:

- I would like to request any policy or document that describes your trust's current approach for offering choice to patients who have been on an elective pathway for over 26 weeks.
- 2. I would also like to request any documents regarding a pilot scheme for or about 26 week choice at your trust.

The 26 Choice that I am referring to is outlined in the following document and specifically explained in the following text from that document. https://www.england.nhs.uk/wp-content/uploads/2020/01/2020-21-NHS-Operational-Planning-Contracting-Guidance.pdf

"A number of pilot sites across the country are now putting in place practical solutions to offer patients who have been waiting for 26 weeks on an RTT pathway a meaningful choice of an alternative provider. During 2020/21, all providers and systems should be implementing supplementary choice at 26 weeks with reference to the 26 Week Choice Rules and Guidance and the best practice models emerging from the pilot programme. In preparation, providers should ensure they have robust validation arrangements in place, so that waiting list data are as accurate as possible".

Response:

The national planning guidance which includes a reference to the 26 week standard was published on the 31st January 2020 (please see page 13). This planning guidance sets out the priorities for the NHS for the financial year 2020/21. The Trust needs to work towards implementing these standards from April 2020.

The 26 week standard was originally outlined as part of a national clinical review of waiting time standards; the initial report was published in March 2019. The report set out a series of new standards to be piloted including a 26 week choice standard.

A progress report was published by the national team in October 2019. These documents provide a list of Trusts that are piloting the new standards. University Hospitals Bristol is not involved in the pilot of the 26 week standard. However, the Trust was selected to pilot the average waiting time for incomplete pathways standard.
